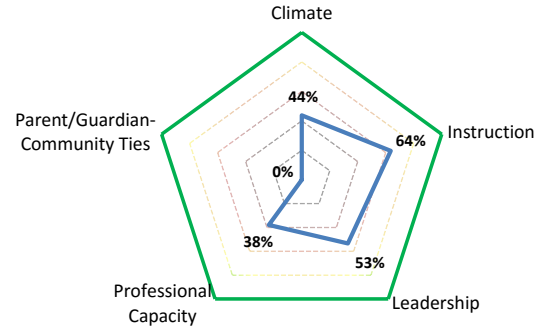

Indicators can be used to easily identify a school's relative strengths and areas most in need of support.

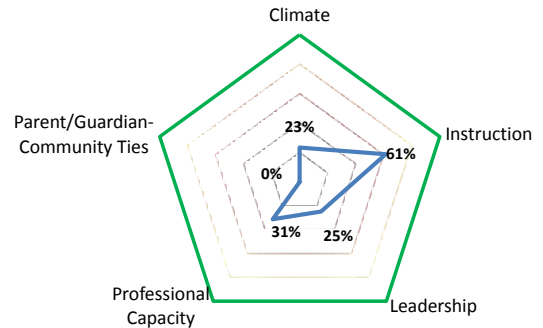
